As TESL Canada's member services have been greatly reduced for 2018, TESL Canada will submit to ATESL a proposal for a revised memorandum of understanding. At that time, the two associations will begin negotiations around ATESL's 2018 TESL Canada fees. ATESL has paid all TESL Canada membership fees which were due to July 1, 2017 as per the biannual fee agreement in place with TESL Canada. In the interim, if ATESL members wish to

update their membership with TESL Canada, you may do so through the TESL Canada website. TESL membership fees are not expected to change in 2018.

# TESL Canada Representative

The TESL Canada board remains active during this transitional time. ATESL welcomes Celia Logan to her (new) term as TESL Canada Representative. Celia took on this role during a time of upheaval. On Wednesday and Thursday, February 21 and 22, 2018, the Alberta Teachers of English as a Second Language (ATESL) and NorQuest College are hosting the Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) funded conference for LINC educators and program coordinators/managers. The 2017 ATESL Conference welcomed 450 registrants, benefited from the generosity of 12 sponsors, and included 64 student volunteers who contributed to the conference in a variety of ways. They were generous with their time and accessible to conference attendees. They helped set the tone for the success of the conference. Thank you to the invited speakers who include Espen Stranger-Johannessen (University of British Columbia) and invited panelists from Bow Valley College who include Joy Stillwell, Tiffany Allard, Dan Merryfield, Wanda Warkentin, and Nadia Khan.

According to the post-conference survey results, attendees seemed to agree that the conference was a tremendous success. Of course, as expected, there were mixed reviews. Overall, the majority of survey respondents indicated their gratitude to the planning committee for organizing such a great event, but there were also some of the common contradictory conference criticisms. - 2. You need to demonstrate in the application the appropriateness of the proposed event or course of studies.
- 3. You need to mention a return to Alberta to work following the course of studies.
- 4. You must describe how you are unable to receive this funding from other sources. Financial need must be evident.
- 5. You must be willing to write a 250-word report of the program or event, and agree to have it published in the ATESL newsletter or website, and/or present at a conference or local meeting.
