Calgary Local Report

The Center for Newcomers welcomed 28 attendees to our first PD session of the year on January 25. We had three great presentations:

- 1. Teach more in Less time using Authentic Online Materials: Shabana Shahzad shared how she had taught Bylaws of Calgary using online authentic materials. She also shared the four tasks which she had developed and used in class along with the hard copies of the tasks.
- 2. Using Plain Language in the Classroom: Rabia Garewal presented on what plain language is; how to write in it; how to speak clearly and how to incorporate it into classroom practice.
- 3. Perspectives on Introversion and Engagement in the Adult ESL Classroom: Research indicates that introversion is a multi-dimensional aspect of personality that can affect how individuals learn English. Dr. Kelti Giles presented her research on how students who display introverted tendencies engage in ESL classrooms and provide some strategies for educators in working with such students.

Our second PD session welcomed 25 participants. It was held on March 8 at SAIT where Brock J. Wojtalewicz facilitated an interactive session "Enhancing Language Assessment, Instruction, and Curricular Design with a Focus on Vocabulary". He utilized insights from current research in applied linguistics to provide practical advice for improving vocabulary assessment and instruction, as well as for designing materials with an explicit focus on lexis.

The Calgary local would also like to inform that our Treasurer, Peggy Jubien, has recently resigned from this role after two years of dedicated service. We would like to thank Peggy for her contribution to this organization and wish her luck with her future endeavors. The role of the Treasurer was assumed by our new member, Elaine Mew, who works at the Centre for Newcomers.

Our next PD session is to be held at Bow Valley College on May 10. This session will involve three 20-minute sessions on using technology in the classroom. The presentation details will be shared once solidified.

Paula Kristmanson of the University of New Brunswick has taken over as Acting President and has been focusing on four areas: TESL Canada Journal; Teacher Certification; Teacher Training Accreditation; improved communication with members. Paula has sent two letters at the end of January and February basically trying to keep the membership up-to-date with TESL Canada's efforts in the four areas. 1. <u>Ingrid Johnston</u> for Friday, October 12 in the morning

Dr. Ingrid Johnston is a Professor of English Education and Curriculum Studies in the Department of Secondary Education at the University of Alberta, Edmonton. She grew up in Britain and South Africa, where she completed a BA and teaching diploma at the University of Kwa-Zulu Natal. Currently she teaches courses in Postcolonial Theories, Issues and Curriculum. Her research focuses on postcolonial literary studies, multicultural literary education, questions of culture, migration and teacher education

2. Jennifer Foote for Friday, October 12 in the afternoon

Dr. Jennifer Foote is an assistant professor of in the Faculty of Extension at the University of Alberta. Jennifer believes difficulties with pronunciation can create barriers to employment and successful integration for newcomers to Canada. Her research explores what

contributes to the intelligibility of speech for second language users communicating in different language contexts and, further, seeks evidence-based solutions to help learners improve intelligibility, thus facilitating greater communicative success in their communities and workplaces.

3. <u>Michel Chikwanine</u> has been confirmed as a keynote for Saturday, October 13

Former Child Soldier/Inspirational Speaker on the Ability to Create Change

Michel Chikwanine has overcome unimaginable pain and struggles. Born in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Michel grew up amid the terror of the Great War of Africa. Much of his childhood was ravaged by the death and decay of a war that claimed the lives of 5.8 million people, his father included, and forced him to be a child soldier. Now, a United Nations Fellow for People of African Descent, Michel inspires people to believe in their ability to make a difference and leaves audiences with a new perspective on life, a sense of hope through social responsibility, and a desire for change.

LGBTQ Advocacy & Awareness

As members of the Advocacy Committee of ATESL, we seek to advocate for the needs of newcomer groups, as well as teachers of English as a Second Language. In this newsletter, the committee would like to take this opportunity to provide a brief overview of some recent research on one such newcomer group – individuals who identify as LGBTQ - and share a few resources for both teachers and for students in your classes who may wish to connect with these resources.

A recent influx of LGBTQ newcomers has led to an increase in awareness and services for this population, in particular, refugee claimants seeking asylum because of their sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. A 2016 report entitled "Provisioning Settlement Services for LGBTQ Newcomers to Edmonton" prepared for the Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers (EMCN) offers some insight for individuals working with LGBTQ newcomers:

- Confidentiality is critical for LGBTQ newcomers because of the homophobia that exists within many newcomer communities (p.4)
- Settlement agencies may have a role to play in connecting LGBTQ newcomers to their co-national communities and combating homophobia in these communities to make LGBTQ individuals feel safer.
- LGBTQ individuals may need to be referred to counselling and supports to help them navigate their new life in Canada, including the homophobia that they may encounter, as well as the re-traumatization that they may face as they go through the refugee process.

For newcomers, there are several new supports available to help them find their way in Edmonton.

- In September 2017, EMCN hired Basel Abou Hamrah to work as an LGBTQ settlement practitioner. His role at the centre is to assist refugee claimants with their refugee applications, and to help them find housing, medical care, and social connections.
- Basel and another colleague from EMCN, Sara Buczynski, also started up an LGBTQ newcomers group to
 encourage them to support each other and socialize together. Interested individuals can contact Basel at EMCN for
 details about when the group meets. The group can also be found on Facebook by searching "LGBTQ +
 Newcomers Edmonton." Allies (individuals who are supportive but do not identify as LGBTQ) are also welcome to
 attend weekly events and offer connection.

For teachers or other interested allies, the Ontario Council of Agencies Serving Immigrants (OCASI) offers a free LGBTQ+ Positive Space Webinar Series that provides some general training on LGBTQ topics.
