Conference Rates

We know that some of our members have continued to experience financial hardship over the past few years, so the Board has kept conference registration fees on par with what we had for our past online conferences as opposed to our in person conference rates.

Annual Membership Fee Increase

As we continue to grow as an organization, there is an ongoing need to be transparent and have scheduled fee increases for membership. As we see increasing costs of doing business, it is unfair to have significant fee increases once every 4 or 5 years. In the coming year we will

continue to discuss what annual increases might look like. In the interim, the Board has approved a 2.5% increase for 2024, which will become effective on January 1, 2024. The purpose of this initiative is to have a steady increase in membership fees on an annual basis, as opposed to increasing membership fees at unknown intervals.

Table 1: Membership Fee Increase

Note: The fees in the table are based on a 1 year Regular Membership. All membership rates will be adjusted accordingly.

In the coming months, the Board will consult with the membership and continue to have discussions to develop a long term plan for an annual membership fee increase. It is anticipated that this will be brought for a membership vote at the 2024 AGM.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Safe Space Policy

In July 2023, the Board approved the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Safer Space Policy. The purpose of this letter is to provide a Vision, Principles, and Commitment to an EDI Safe Space for all ATESL environments and our members. This policy was drafted by the Advocacy Committee and we would like to thank everyone who had a hand in completing this. A special thank you to Alexandra Marshall for taking the lead on this project and providing a wonderful policy for review. The policy has been posted on the ATESL website since August 2023 and we encourage all members to become familiar with it.

Wage Equity

At the end of 2022, we drafted a letter to the Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship. The purpose of this letter is to advocate for the employment practices throughout Alberta, specifically in the disparity in wages, work conditions and health benefits. Since this letter was drafted, we shared it with other provincial organizations and we have received support from TESL Ontario, TESL Manitoba and TESL Saskatchewan. The next step for this letter prior to delivering it to the Minister will be to gather support from TESL Canada.

Anti-Racism Symposium

In the last year, we have had a focus on engaging our members on EDI & Anti-Racism projects. In December we held an Anti-Racism Symposium, where three speakers: Suzanne Clavelle, Iftu Hargaaya, and Alexandra Marshall led discussions on topics of Indigenous Awareness, Racism, 2SLGBTQ+. A special thank you to Irene Wood, Sofia Elgueta, and Gabriela Jessome for coordinating this effort.

Multiculturalism and Anti-Racism Grant (MARG)

In the fall of 2022, ATESL submitted a proposal to the Alberta government for their Multiculturalism and Anti-Racism Grant. ATESL was successful in being engaged to develop Multicultural and Anti-racism resources for CLB 3 to CLB 4 levels. This project is currently ongoing and we would like to extend a warm thank you to our Project Coordinator Haimei Wang, Resource Developer Jeremy Wilson, and their amazing team of experts. We hope you were able to attend their session. They are sending out calls for volunteers for their pilot program and we encourage you to join if you are able.

Communications Chair and Social Media Committee

ATESL created advertising guidelines and role descriptions for a developed Communications Chair role and a social media coordinator. As we see a higher need to be more involved and engaging through online advertisement and on social media, we saw a need to have dedicated positions. The role of the Communications Chair is to design Professional Development and ATESL related posts, as well to schedule posts and event reminders in a timely manner. In addition to these responsibilities, the Chair will also coordinate the social media posts on specific calendar events.

A special thank you to Sarah Kopichanski for accepting the role of Communications Chair and to Zuzana Buchanan for stepping into the Coordinator role. Additionally, we want to extend a warm thank you to Hannah Nguyen for handling the social media posts for the 2023 ATESL Conference.

On the third Thursday of every month ATESL holds a "Let's Talk About....." series. These are incredible sessions that have been coordinated by Donna Clarke from The Immigrant Education Society (TIES) Literacy Centre of Expertise. A very special thank you to Donna for all of her hard work and coordination of these events.

Local Chapter Summaries

The locals resiliently continue to provide an outstanding number of Professional Development opportunities to members through virtual sessions and workshops. Bursary

The bursary committee consists of three individuals; Wendy Illott (Treasurer), Tingyi Sun (Secretary) and Gabriela Jessome (Past President). Bursaries are some of the benefits offered to ATESL members. The Board approved applications totalling **\$1395** this year for three recipients. Additionally there were bursaries provided to four speakers at the 2023 conference for the First Time Conference Presenter bursary at \$250 each.

Alberta Routes

ATESL's relationship with Alberta Routes (formerly Rural Routes) continues to grow and we are

devoted to continuing our extremely valuable partnership with NorQuest College to reach our members and learners in more remote areas of the province.

ATESL takes this opportunity to thank all members of the Alberta Routes program with NorQuest College, including our new Board member Rosalia Dela Cruz who has done an amazing job keeping the Board informed of changes that took place over the last year.

Inter-Provincial Partnerships

ATESL continues to meet with interprovincial associations sharing issues such as upcoming initiatives, association updates, ideas, and information, as well as discussing joint efforts to advocate for wage equity. These interprovincial meetings have provided a great opportunity for collaboration across provincial boundaries, as seen with the engagement from several interprovincial organizations with the newly drafted wage equity letter. We look forward to continuing these efforts with all of the provincial organizations.

ATESL Advocacy Committee

The Advocacy Committee is made up of a group of dedicated and devoted professionals, inspired to action from their dedication to quality education and commitment to further causes that support the well-being of ESL learners and teachers.

The ATESL Board would also like to formally thank Alexandra Marshall for her leadership, guidance and hard work for the Advocacy Committee over the past few years. While we are saddened to see Alexandra move from this position, we are equally grateful to welcome Justine Light to the position of Advocacy Chair. We are excited to see how this committee will continue to grow over the next year. Our yearly audit was successful once again, and we are grateful for our auditors at Halpert Monsma for all their advice and feedback. ATESL continues to explore alternate avenues for funding and the Board is committed to increasing annual revenue in order to keep the organization profitable.

2023 Bursary Committee Annual Report

The Bursary Committee consists of three ATESL board members: Gabriela Jessome (Past President), Wendy llott (Treasurer), and Tingyi Sun (Secretary).

The ATESL bursary for professional development is one of the many advantages of membership. This year, four applications were received for the March and September deadlines, three of which met the criteria. The Bursary Committee is pleased to have supported three members for their participation in TESL-related academic/professional conferences (i.e., Canadian Association of Applied Linguistics Annual Conference) and for post secondary coursework (i.e., Anti-Racism Strategies for the Workplace, Teaching Reading, Writing and Grammar). Alberta Routes Report

The ESL Rural Routes Program Initiative carried out by NorQuest College is now *Alberta Routes*. In 2022, responding to a recommendation from Advanced Education, the Rural Routes team embarked on a process of finding a new name, one that better reflects the scope of the program's reach and practice beyond 'rural' and 'ESL'. Surveys and focus groups were conducted with partners from the Community Learning Network, and in Spring 2023, the new name was launched: **Alberta Routes: Building Capacity in Community Educators.** The name change also coincides with the belated celebration of the program's 20th anniversary and expresses its ongoing commitment to supporting community adult learning programs across the province.

Alberta Routes continues to provide free professional development workshops and study groups on the following general categories of topics:

- Teaching Strategies & Frameworks
- Tools and Resources
- Teaching Online
- Assessment
- Community Connections and Programming
- Inclusion and Diversity

Other services include classroom visits, mentorship support for tutors, instructors, and program coordinators, and a library of online resources.

Over the past year, Alberta Routes:

- 1. Completed two (2) community needs assessments supporting four (4) community adult learning programs and several communities in Southern Alberta
- Created new content for workshops (Best Practices for Online Teaching and Integrating Anti-Racism in EAL Teaching Practices) and a new study group on EAL Tutor Essentials, which builds on its popular ESL Tutor Training workshop and received a great deal of interest especially from new tutors
