In response, the Board and the Advocacy Committee have been working hard to represent our membership. The first letter to IRCC sent in January addressed wage equity and was also co-signed by our interprovincial committee and a second letter regarding funding cuts was also sent in February. Further, a template was created and is available for all members should they wish to send a personalized letter. The template is linked <u>HERE</u>. We remain committed to ensuring our voices are heard!



In early December 2024, a survey was sent out to the membership regarding a potential name change. 63% of the respondents to the survey agreed that the ATESL name needed to be updated for better inclusivity. Of the presented options, the favored name was 'ATEAL: Alberta Teachers of English as an Additional Language'. The costs associated with the name change are minimal at both Alberta Registries and with the logo and website update.

Advocacy

Our committee comprises both a past and current president, a chair, and five members: Sofia Elgueta Duplancic, May Yeung, Hyeyung Park, Livia Fajkusz, Eman Ghanem, Yuji Abe, and Herly Cervera. We convene regularly via Zoom on a monthly basis to discuss a range of issues and initiatives aimed at advocating for our members and learners.

In November 2024, the newly launched Advocacy Committee began actively engaging in a range of initiatives to address members' concerns and sector-wide challenges. The committee focused on policy advocacy, initiating a member survey to inform 2025 priorities and sending follow-up correspondence to IRCC regarding wage equity and funding cuts, including a draft letter targeting Stage 2 LINC funding reductions. Member engagement was a key theme, with the 2025 Advocacy Committee Survey highlighting critical issues such as provincial and federal funding cuts, lack of job security, permanent part-time employment, limited career advancement, and inadequate workplace healthcare. In response to the sudden closure of the Bow Valley College ESL program, the committee explored immediate advocacy strategies, including Livia's proposal for a social business model and Janice McCrimmon's leadership in mobilizing support for affected members and learners. The committee remains committed to responsive and sustained advocacy as the sector navigates funding instability and program disruptions.



TESL Canada

In March, TESL Canada's board met to discuss the recent funding cuts that have led to program closures in Alberta. The board has decided to form an advocacy committee to assess the impact across Alberta and other provinces and to engage with stakeholders in support of affected teachers and students.

For members' information, the TESL Canada Annual General Meeting (AGM) is scheduled for Wednesday, April 30 at 7:00 p.m. EST.





Ethnocultural Grant
