PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Valuing what we do, who we are ... Singing praises for unsung heroes

So many acknowledgements need to be made regarding the work of our members. The work of Terese Szlamp-Fryga and Greg Sowak put it in and their many committee members and members-at-large resulted in an excellent and well-attended conference this past October in Edmonton. The work of the local executives both in Edmonton and Calgary, the work of past and current provincial board and committee members — too many to mention and too many that I would not care to omit. My sincere thanks to all the volunteers this past year and those who are working this year to give back to the organization. The opportunity to thank participating members is pivotal to my first message as ATESL president.

The reality of the ESL field is that the average ESL professional (whether working in administration, research or the classroom) works part-time, on tenuous contract terms or even for several different organizations. Relatively few full-time, permanent positions exist. We are sometimes so focused on where our next assignment is coming from, whether we are going to get our contracts renewed or if the program we have devoted our energy to will have its funding renewed that we feel we don't have the energy or security to explore our profession and connect with each other through ATESL events. We might not have control over the realities of our work situations, but we do have control over what we can contribute to the organization that brings us together as a result of our common experiences and expertise.

The diversity of areas we work in are as complex as our employment situations but common to all of us is the nucleus of our profession — teaching English language and culture to a

multifaceted group of people — international students, immigrant adults as well as children.

Whenever I attend local meetings, I meet people whom I have worked with in one capacity or another in a variety of work situations. Yet the institutional label does not define the professional, it is the profession they belong to that defines them. If we just lifted the institutional labels from the organizations we work for, we would find a community of colleagues whom we have worked side by side with in many different capacities over the years. Recycling ourselves into new organizations doesn't change our essence and our common aspirations. This is why ATESL is so important. It removes an institutional label that is sometimes apt to create division and competition and instead brings us together though a common ground — our profession.

We all have something of value to contribute to the profession and to ATESL. Although accreditation is highly valued, advocated and encouraged by ATESL to our members, it is not a prerequisite for becoming a member. Although I am not discouraging members from seeking accreditation — it is an essential goal of ours to offer this to members — you don't need to wait to be accredited or have to decide to be accredited to participate and be considered a valuable member of ATESL.

In this issue of the ATESL newsletter, I would like to draw members' attention to calls for participation in a number of different committees. Although the accreditation committee criteria require members to be accredited, there are other ATESL committees looking for members to participate, whether accredited or not. As they are looking for involvement from our members, the Conference committee, Learners Affairs committee and Special Profiles committee will be highlighted in this newsletter. The local ATESL associations are actively recruiting

new members. There is even an opportunity to apply for the recently approved paid position of newsletter editor.

My hope with the Special Profiles section of the newsletter and the related committee is to offer an opportunity to acknowledge and value the accomplishments of our members and the students we serve. We tend to be humble, unassuming and afraid to openly celebrate our contributions to the community we work in. Perhaps having a forum in which to honour the accomplishments of our unsung heroes will be a step in the direction we are heading as an organization — to elevate the profile of our profession in the community of professionals. We need to take pride in what we do and openly proclaim it. Greater membership participation, promotion of accreditation and public acknowledgement of our members and the success of our students are crucial steps in raising the profile and professional image of our vocation.
